#### Pieces of History With Karen Neibarger

We left you last month with the Classic Corset Company going into bankruptcy after building a state-of-the-art factory on Columbia Avenue. Fortunately, the Chicago based Gossard Corset company bought most of the equipment at the auction in Belvidere and was ready to open within a few months. While some workers stayed on with the new owners, additional employees were needed. Ads appeared in the local papers and recruiters were sent to Caledonia, Capron, Poplar Grove, and Garden Prairie to attract young women to sew the corsets that were now in demand throughout the fashion world. It was a rare opportunity for economic independence for young women and housewives in 1903.

We can imagine the conversations around the kitchen table as daughters, wives and mothers talked of going outside the family home to work in a factory – on machinery! The Gossard company emphasized short hours, liberal wages, specially constructed, light airy workrooms, a high-grade lunch room and hot coffee and fresh, sweet milk furnished free. In addition, the company offered the opportunity to be a "forelady" or even a "manager" of a department.

The attraction of extra money coming into the household was a determining force in many situations but the introduction of factory work in Belvidere for women along with the introduction of women's rights and value in the market place would also have entered into the discussion. By 1905 Gossard's working force had passed the 100 mark and by 1916 the company was advertising for "50 more workers offering six dollars per week while learning. And no dirt or grease to soil your hands or clothes. Girls working at Gossard's can finish their day's work as if dressed for a party." (More to come.)
